Educational Aims of the Programme

The course aims to equip graduate with the skills needed to work in the creative industry. The program is designed to have a focus on photographic practice with an underpinning of contextual knowledge and business acumen. The course does not define the genre or style of photography, but it does offer and suggest career trajectories. The ethos of the course is to support and help to develop students to achieve a career in whatever aspect they choose.

The overarching aim for the course is that students have a good understanding of producing photography, but that they have a good underpinning of contextual and historical knowledge and that they are able to sell themselves.

The overall aims of the programme are to:

- Provide a challenging high quality vocational programme in Photography, including core and specialist modules, which facilitate access and progression for a wide range of students from diverse backgrounds.
- Offer a robust and vocationally relevant foundation degree that will allow students to develop their interests personally and professionally.

- Develop graduates who have the ability to reflect and learn from their workplace experience in the photographic industry and relate this experience to progress into work or progress onto the top-up.
- Develop graduates who have a balance between subject specific skills (expressive, creative, technical) and transferable skills (communication, teamwork, project management) which are key to being employable in the photographic industry
- Develop graduates who have an analytical and reflective understanding of photography in the context of the workplace today and in relation to the wider social and cultural environment.

Programme Structure

Overview of structure of the modules across the Academic Year.

Full-time route:

Level 4:

Solid foundations of technical photographic skills are laid through a twenty credit semester one module that focuses on photographic skills in *Photographic Production Skills* this leads students to undertake the *Photographic Practice Portfolio and Photographic Practice Ideas, Processes and Concepts* Modules that focuses on ideas, processes and concepts. Introduces the principles and practices of working as a photographer within the *Introduction to the Photographic Industry* module. This is a part theory and part practical module, student focus on theoretical aspect of industry topics then are asked to put these skills and understanding into a work based context (practical photography). Parallel to the practical skills is the development of the students' contextual knowledge within *Photographic Discourse* Module which underpins and informs the other modules. Teaching and learning comprises of a wide variety of lectures, seminars, practical sessions and written work. This is further supported by tutorials and online resources / activities.

Level 5:

Level 5 builds upon the skills and knowledge gained during Level 4. Photographic skills are built upon on in the *Contextualising Your Photographic Practice* in which students start to focus their studies on their own career trajectory and to stretch students conceptual understanding in the *Extended Photographic Project* Module allowing increased autonomy to define their specialised area of photographic practice. Academic and creative skills are developed through, firstly, *Contextualising Your Photographic Practice* module where the students are encouraged to consider their photography in connection with external ideas. Secondly within the *Extended Photographic Project* Module which provides the opportunity to conduct independent research. At Level 5 there is also a focus on real industry application through *Working in the Photographic Industry*. This module provides the student with real experience of working within the Photographic Industry through a focus on self-promotion and work experience, the *Collaborative Project module* is designed to develop their communication, interpersonal and creative skills. As with Level 4, teaching and learning comprises of a wide variety of lectures, seminars, practical sessions and written work, but here we have more emphasis on large-scale student-led projects. Again, all learning is further supported by tutorials and online resources / activities.

Students exiting after completing one year of study, having gained 120 credits, may be eligible for a Certificate in Higher Education.

5. Distinctive features of the programme structure

The course is designed to allow students to find their own career trajectory. The course does not adopt a house style, and instead of this the course is to offer different genres and styles of photography; allowing student to discover the area of photography they wish to enter. The course is very much geared towards practical photography, covering a range of foundation skills and discussing ideas in level 4. Level 5 allows more autonomy with a supportive pastoral role by tutors to allow career and skill development.

The course has three distinct facets. To support the photographic practice elements, students will undertake modules in academic studies (Photographic Discourse level 4 and Contextualising Photographic, level 5). Within these modules students will discuss issues related to ethics and current theories within photography. In the industry modules (Introduction to the Photographic Industry, level 4 and Working in the Photographic Industries, level 5) students will be exposed to the working of the creative industry in terms of both the mechanics and theory, then underpinned by work experience.

To keep abreast of industry we have a deal with Adobe meaning that the Macs always have the latest version of Adobe Master Suite.

Strong teaching team in terms of industry experience and academic qualifications, who undertake both commercial and contemporary art settings which supports student progress and access to the industry.

6. Support for students and their learning

Support for Students and Their Learning

The award adopts the approach to student learning support as identified in the Scheme programme specification.

- Tailored induction support begins before students arrive with the admissions team, and is reinforced at the detailed induction programme
- A robust communications system functions to give students access to lecturers and management; this includes e-mail, the VLE and notice boards in studios.
- All necessary information about the programme is provided by means of the student handbook, module handbooks and the VLE.

- Each student is allocated a tutor for regular tutorials and personal development planning. This is implemented in the first term and continued throughout the two years of study
- There is an extensive range of learning resources in the Library, supported by specialist staff who provide bespoke study skills sessions for students.
- The University provides an extensive range of services for students, including support for those with special needs
- There is a range of student services such as welfare, counselling, financial and careers advice

7. Criteria for admission

A typical offer would normally be 120 tariff points where this is made up of appropriate level 3 qualifications, such as full A levels or BTEC L3 Diploma. This could be translated as 2 x D at A level, or a Merit profile in a relevant BTEC L3 Diploma (MM) or BTEC L3 Extended Diploma (MMP), together with 5 of GCSE grades at C or above including English (Maths isn't required). However, factors such as previous experience and performance at interview can support the application.

Non Standard Entry

We welcome applications from mature candidates who may not have met the academic criteria, but can demonstrate a wealth of experience in their chosen field. Candidates in this category and otherwise are likely to be interviewed to assess their suitability for the course and asked to provide a portfolio of evidence to support their application.

In the absence of formal learning qualifications applications are welcomed from persons who can demonstrate relevant work experience, including work in a voluntary capacity.

The course structure actively supports claims for Accreditation of Prior Certified Learning (APCL) and Accreditation of Prior Experiential Learning (APEL).

International qualifications will be assessed against these criteria. Speakers of other languages will need to possess an IELTS band score of 6.0 (with no-less than 5.5 in any one element) or a recognised English Level 2 qualification.

Students on the course will be expected to go on work placement as part of the programme of study.

All students are to present a portfolio and supporting academic text. This is undertaken during an interview or correspondence for distance applicants.
